#### Shea 2016 Conference in Bamako

The Global Shea Alliance (GSA) will host its international conference at the Centre International de Conférence de Bamako (CICB) in Bamako, Mali from March 21 to 23, 2016.

The conference "Shea 2016: Enhancing Farm Value" will examine the shea industry's key role in improving food security and climate friendly agriculture by promoting farms that protect the environment, diversify food sources, and generate income from local and export markets. Panel sessions will also address key issues including the health benefits of shea as a food ingredient.

# GSA Opens Office in Washington, D.C.

In September, the Global Shea Alliance opened its first overseas satellite office in Washington, D.C. The United States office will be led by Yvette Badu-Nimako, who joins the Secretariat as the U.S. Operations Manager.

The new office will focus on shea promotion activities including an annual conference, research into shea health benefits, policy advocacy, and membership expansion. The office will also undertake fundraising activities to support the GSA sustainability program.


### **Pilot Project for Warehouses**

In collaboration with the USAID West Africa Trade Hub and African Partners Network, the GSA launched a one-year initiative to fund business development trainings for 20 women's groups. Through the pilot project, 600 women will learn about business development skills, cooperative development and management, shea kernel aggregation, and accounting and contract management.

At the conclusion of the project, the pilot program will benefit 6,000 women who will aggregate large volumes of kernels in these warehouses and sell directly to wholesale buyers, improving their profit per kilo between 50% to 100% above the June village price.







## 2015 Sustainability Working Group

Each year the Global Shea Alliance convenes a bi-annual sustainability-working group to address challenges to the empowerment of women shea collectors and the conservation of shea tree populations across Africa. The working group is made up of a representative mix of GSA members and partners from all levels of the shea value chain. The working group will meet in Tamale, Ghana on November 9-11.

#### Success Stories from the Field

#### **Business Development and Quality Trainings for Women in Benin**

With the help of Association Karité Benin and the Global Shea Alliance, a woman's group in Bori, Benin, 70 km outside of Parakou, has received trainings on shea nut processing and cooperative organization. The 1,233 members of the ANTISUA group learned proper processing and storing techniques as well as how to engage with potential buyers. Madelaine, a member of the group, remarked that "with our training



and increased income, we are able to send our children to school, take care of our families when they are sick and feed and clothe them."

After signing a contract, the women received approximately \$12,500 including a bonus from the buyer for high quality nuts. The bonus raised the women's income 15% over traditional farm gate prices. While quality raises women's income, aggregation through warehouses can raise women's income by an additional 30 – 45%.

To date, Alliance Karité Benin has trained over 247 women's groups and has built 1 warehouse. By the end of 2016, they will have trained 300 groups across northern and central Benin and will construct 15 more warehouses.

Through a USAID grant, the Global Shea aims to provide over 5,000 women shea collectors from 250 women's groups across West Africa in quality, aggregation and market linkages trainings. With the help of USAID, ICCO and other donors, the GSA will construct 50 warehouses by 2016.
